The Bundawarrah Centre - Temora NSW

The Bundawarrah Centre was another stop on last years Wolseley car club rally.

The Bundawarrah Centre was established in 2011 due to the expansion of the original Temora Rural Museum, it is managed by the local Temora shire and has a dedicated group of volunteers, the building from the road looks modern and welcoming.

The centre houses many different collections from around the area that locals collected, to the heritage of the area. In the collection is the Temora Rock and Mineral Museum, a gentleman called Athol Stean collected rocks and fossils, basically his life, love and passion. I was taken back of the size of the room and collection, how many rocks can one person collect.

I ask you a question, how many lawn mowers are made, makes, models, within one shed, I can say lots, again, ask, how many TVs have been made, and tractors, stationary engines! List goes on. There are over 40 buildings to go through and easily spend 4-6 hours wandering around. A museum dedicated to yesteryear!

If this doesn't blow you away, the NSW Fire and Rescue exhibition, along with the Temora Ambulance Museum will. How many Ambulances can you count in the one shed, let alone the collection of matchbox ambulances. I didn't realise that there were that many made. The exhibition has a record of the achievements of the ambulance service within the community.



The vehicles are all in great condition, as they have just come out of service. The walls are lined with matchbox cars, uniforms, first aid kits and variety of articles regarding history. Of course, the museum has the usual suspects in Ford F100's as they were popular around Australia, but there are Dodges, Valiants, Fairlanes, Falcons, Commodores, Internationals, and a FJ Holden. Each vehicle tells a story, there is

plans in the future to build a bigger building as there are plenty of items that cannot be shown on display due to a lack of room, I will have to revisit once done!

The XA Falcon was put into service in 1973 after being bought by the West District Ambulance service from Golden West motors in Parkes, It was stationed in Parkes and Trundle until it was pulled from service in 1981, it sat in storage for 30 years, until the NSW Ambulance service donated it to the museum in 2010.

The FJ Holden was sold new by Suttons Motors, Temora in January 1956, and was in service from February 1956 till 1973.



Another interesting shed located in the The Bundawarrah Centre, is the NSW fire and rescue exhibition, this shed is very much like the Ambulance shed, a line up of fire trucks, forestry fire trucks and memorabilia, trucks include the Bedfords, Blitzs, Chevrolet, Internationals, Dodge and what I call rare, the BMC. The is also some horse drawn equipment. Again, this keeps you interested. With so much to look at.

The BMC fire truck was built in 1966 and is a 6-cylinder petrol engine, 4 speed gear box and a 2wd. It spent majority of its career at Scotts Flat Brigade in the Singleton Shire.

The 1949 Chevrolet Maple leaf was purchased by the Coolamon Shire council to be used



as a fire tanker; the pump motor is a twin cylinder Petters. When the Coolamon Shire upgraded, the truck was put up for tender with Marravale and Berri-Jerry fire brigades both offering \$275. Ownership was decided with a toss of the coin and Marravale won and used the truck until into was decommissioned in 1976. It still has the Marravale fire brigade sign writing on it.

As you continue to walk around the site, you come across a open shed full of vintage tractors, very much along the lines of my friends collection at Westbury. Shaws. I spotted many tractors I knew the models of after years of working with Glenn and hearing these stories. There was John Deeres, Internationals, Hanomags, Bulldogs, Massey, Ferggie's etc. I don't think I have ever seen some many Lanz bulldogs in one location. As you move on there is a shed setup as a shearing shed from back in the day, all with stationary motor with shearing attachments, a tool shop too. A shed setup with a stage, as an old-time music hall, with many memorabilia from the days gone by. Signs included. Big bulldozers, to old school rooms, one house apparently had Don Bradman live in it. As a baby. If I haven't said this enough, the town of Temora is well worth the visit.


Dorset's first motor cars and cycles

While the motor car was invented in the late 1880s it wasn't until the start of the 20th century that volume production of cars began. The first mass produced car is recorded as the Oldsmobile in 1901. Henry Ford began producing his now-famous Model-T Fords in Detroit in 1908.

So it may come as a surprise to learn that in Tasmania Parliament passed a Motor Traffic Act in 1907 which required motor cars, motor cycles and drivers to be registered. It then took until 1909 for appropriate Regulations to be enacted, by which time the first car and motor cycle could be registered. The numbering sequence began at 1, and applied to cars and motor cycles. The first motor vehicle in Tasmania, Registration Number 1, was issued in March 1909 to a Mr Bruce W. Tevelein of Patterson Street, Launceston.

It took only seven months after that first registration for people from Dorset to register. A. E. Holmes of Scottsdale registered a motor cycle, number 357, and Norton Sharman registered 359. The business of Patmore and Dinham registered a motor car, number 358 and Mr. H. T. Waterworth of Pioneer registered car number 361. The records do not tell us what type of car or cycle was registered in each case.

'A. E. Holmes' is interesting as it could be the father, Arthur Ernest Holmes, aged 43, who was an Inspector of Roads, or his 18-year-old son Alfred Ernest Holmes who would go on to run a Cycle and Motor Works business in Scottsdale in later years. The other motor cycle registrant, Norton Sharman, was aged 18, perhaps suggesting that this was the younger man's choice of transport in the early days.



History tells us that these early vehicles were problematic and, let's be honest, quite dangerous, not the least because of the state of the roads (where they existed) and the need to share the road with horses and carts. In 1915 A. E. Holmes of Scottsdale (the father, we presume) was reported as suffering a serious loss when his large Talbot motor car caught fire through backfiring, resulting in £100 of damages, though the car was insured.

Four years later he was driving into Launceston when his car had an encounter with a horse and cart near Rocherlea. The cart overturned and the rider was thrown out onto the road. The newspaper report suggests that the horse was practically uninjured, the horse rider had a cut face, but the car was considerably damaged!

The North-Eastern Advertiser is working with the Dorset Tasmania History Society to publish historical articles so that our history, in stories and images, is not lost. The Society is recording and archiving Dorset's local historical information and can be contacted via their Facebook page.

Thirty cars and 50 people departed Launceston on Sunday, March 10 with overcast conditions making for a cooler and trouble free run to Tam O'Shanter Golf Club for morning tea before continuing on to Scottsdale for lunch at the RSL and Community Club.

Tour Directors Mike and Marion Cassidy said it was a great day.

"After lunch and some leisure time to look around Scottsdale, the Tour headed for

Launceston with a few of the older cars suffering from the high temperature on the climb up the Sideling before stopping at the rest area and a cool down, while entrants enjoyed refreshments supplied by the Scottsdale Lions Club then on the road again for the final leg in Launceston," they said.

Targa's Mick Peart enjoyed a successful day on the road – he was awarded the J. Paine and Son Memorial Trophy for the Best Amateur Restoration of his 1923 Metallurgique, which was making its first run after four years of restoration.

For Sale 1912 Overland 112 Model 59C Doctor's Coupe.

There is only one 112 Model 59C Doctor's Coupe listed in the USA WOKR club register. This was registered to a Canadian owner, but the owner dropped out quite a few years ago, so its current state is unknown. There are no others in Australia.

This car is a replica.

The basic body was built by Norm George, in Victoria, who built/restored several veteran cars over many years. This was his last and he never finished it because he went into a nursing home. The car was bought by an "investor" who sat on it for 10 years, and then decided to sell it. I bought it from him, in the same condition I had seen it at Norm's 10 years earlier. This car has only done perhaps 2000 Km since it was rebuilt. It has been on a Tasmanian rally, the Wangaratta Overland rally, and several other local runs.



Norm built the body from blown up drawings of the Doctor's coupe as shown in the Overland brochures and parts lists. All the mechanicals are standard model 59. The wheels are 23" instead of the standard 25" for the model 59, but are otherwise identical.

The chassis and mechanicals have been totally rebuilt. The radiator is original but has been cleaned and is good. I have fitted a modern starter motor, by fitting a ring gear on the flywheel, so my wife could drive it. The battery is hidden under the driver's seat.

The interior is all Huon Pine woodwork, with tapestry upholstery, and Mahogany dashboard. All the interior brass work - spark/throttle levers, door handles, window levers etc., have been "brass-gold" plated so that they don't tarnish, but look like polished brass (this is not lacquer, it is gold plating!). The doors are monogrammed with the international doctor's symbol - staff with coiled snakes - in gold.

It has LED indicators, and electric horns. The main horn is a brass very early electric/ veteran era horn, mounted in front of the radiator. The other is a modern electric mounted underneath. These are driven by a veteran rubber horn bulb through the usual flexible brass conduit, which drives a multi-stage pressure switch from a washing machine, so that with a gentle squeeze, only the "dulcet toned" brass veteran horn sounds. Squeeze harder and the harsher modern horn warns everyone off. The lights are "Overland "scripted acetylene head lamps, and E & J kerosene side and tail lamps. There is a rectangular brass veteran acetylene generator inset in the left front mudguard. The indicators are operated by a toggle switch discreetly hidden under the driver's seat - under the driver's right leg, along with the starter button.

The ignition is a brass Bosch DU4, rewound, and the ignition "OFF" is by pulling the advance/retard lever all the way down in the retard position. All the electrics and the battery are under the driver's seat, but there are a couple of terminals under the bottom edge of the firewall for connecting a charger. I have found that it will start for several days running without recharging. The starter is really a quite low load on the battery.

The speedo is a brass Jones one driven from the RH front wheel.

The windscreen has a brass split-frame with the top half folding outwards. The door windows operate through a large "brass gold" lever with three positions - Down, Up-with a small ventilation gap, or Fully Up. They slide up the inside of a small, fixed glass window at the top.

It is my understanding that Overland didn't build the bodies for the Doctor's Coupe, the Opera Coupe, and the Light Delivery, even though they were listed in the brochures and parts lists. I understand that the bodies were built to order by various out-side body builders, so apart from the standard body outlines, and the use of standard Overland chassis and other parts, the details would vary according to customer and body-builder preference.
