

Bike on the cover

Fifty years ago, in October 1974, Honda introduced the Gold Wing motor cycle. Its predecessor, the CB750, was the top-of-the-line model, and an excellent seller. The new Gold Wing was a very different motorcycle, with a flat 4-cylinder 1000cc water cooled engine instead of being air cooled, and shaft drive instead of chain drive. It was envisaged as a large sport motorcycle, and consequently was created 'naked', without saddlebags, a windshield, or even wind protection for the rider.

Honda soon found that many owners, particularly in America, were using the bike for long distance cruising, and that meant that Honda had to re-evaluate their ideas and provide comfort for the long haul, wind protection, a smooth ride, a comfortable seat, storage for luggage and plenty of power.

Cole's bike is a fourth generation Gold Wing and is vastly different from the first model. The engine is a 1500cc flat 6-cylinder with a 4-speed gearbox and an electrically assisted reverse gear. The weight of Cole's bike is 360kg dry weight, compared with the first model which had a dry weight of 265kg. It comes complete with many standard equipment items including a radio cassette with 6 speaker sound system which increases in volume as the road speed increases, fairing, panniers and a boot, windshield, cruise control, intercom between rider and passenger, heater, and adjustable air suspension. Cole laments that it has no ashtray or cup holder. Later models also include items such as sat nav, pillion seat backrest, and anti-lock braking.

Cole has owned this bike for around 8 years, and has ridden many thousands of kilometres on it. The odometer is showing over 200,000 km and Cole says there is a club in America for owners of bikes which have travelled in excess of 500,000 miles (that's 800,000 km). When Cole purchased the bike, he set about making it sparkle as we all do with a new purchase, and found a small card in one of the paniers with the name Ralph Stanyer of Maryborough on it. Ralph ordered a white Gold Wing Aspencade new in 1992, but it arrived at the dealership with some damage. He was offered a silver one which he accepted and kept for about 10 years. This is the bike that Cole now owns. The bike has returned home.

The day we spoke was a sunny, warm and pleasant day, and as we all do, Cole said it would be a perfect day for a ride to get a coffee in Maldon. This is the attitude we should take more often and make use of our historic vehicles.

Notes from Federation

Fuel and Lubricant Survey The University of Canberra and the Australian Historic Motoring Federation are conducting a survey on current and future use of fossil fuels and lubricants in operating heritage machines. You can participate by completing the survey at https://uoc.syd1.gualtrics.com/jfe/form/SVeYdZYPxnUunYd3o

Federation recommends that as many club members as possible complete this survey as it provides information for motoring organisations to use when discussing with governments, the future of historic vehicles, machinery, aviation, maritime, engines, and any other old equipment you keep in working order.

In Issue 285 of Restored Cars Graham Allum makes mention of the value of historic vehicles to the national economy. Some points he makes are:

- There are approximately 970,000 motoring-enthusiast owned historic vehicles in Australia.
- Owners spend on average \$10,240 on each vehicle owned, mainly on mechanical and body repairs, and parts and accessories.
- Multiplying this spend by the number of owners, the aggregate direct turnover of this sector is \$9.92 billion.
- Including supply chains, consumables, direct and indirect jobs, the total value to the economy is \$25.2 billion.

For this reason alone we should all complete the survey so that our peak motoring bodies have the statistics on hand to be able to communicate our importance to the economy, and not be over-ridden by ideological politicians with little knowledge.

World Land Speed Records

Holding the world land speed record drives men to dream of the impossible. The first speed record for a motor driven vehicle was achieved on Dec 18th 1898 by a French driver named Gaston De Chaselloup-Laubat driving an electric powered Jeantaud car. He achieved the mind-boggling speed of 39.252 mph. His record stood for 30 days until the speed of 41.420 mph was reached. This record was broken 15 times in the next 5 years until the magic 100mph was achieved on July 21st 1904 by Louis Rigolly in an 8-cylinder internal combustion engine car.

Since then the record has been made to be broken. Just a few of the many land speed records and holders are listed below. There have been many, many more in between these mentioned.

Finally, on October 15 1997, Andy Green became the first person to break the sound barrier in a land vehicle, achieving 760.34 mph (1227.99 km/h) or Mach 1.016.



And on the same subject, Geoff Trengove submitted this:

WORLD LAND SPEED RECORD CARS

Here is the 1957 MG EX 181 in the foreground and the 1938 MG EX 135 in the background.

In 1957 the MG Car Company arrived at the Bonneville Salt Flats with an unusually shaped vehicle and legendary racing driver Stirling Moss.

The car was called the MG EX 181 and it was entered into the Class F land-speed series for cars with engines between 1.1 and 1.5 litres.

The EX 181's unique body was hiding a 1.5 litre twin-cam, supercharged MGA engine that had been tuned to run on 86% methanol laced with nitrobenzene, acetone, and sulphuric ether.

The engine produced 290hp at 7,000rpm and on August 23, 1957 Stirling Moss drove to a top speed of 245.64mph (395.31 kmh), beating the previous record of 203mph.

In 1959 MG returned with racing driver Phil Hill and the engine producing 300hp.

Hill drove to a top speed of 254.91 mph (410.23 kmh), breaking MG's earlier record.
